The Lord Chamberlain's introduction

Welcome to The Royal House of Denmark's annual report for 2022.

The year was characterized by external as well as internal challenges for The Royal House of Denmark.

The war in Europe, the energy and inflation crisis and the general economic instability affected The Royal House of Denmark, just as was the case in the rest of the society. The beginning of the year continued to be marked by the coronavirus pandemic, which meant that The Royal House of Denmark had to cancel or postpone a number of arrangements and events.

In a troubled and unsettled world, The Royal House of Denmark, with its more than 1000-year history, is for many a symbol of continuity and cohesion. For more than a half-century, H.M. The Queen has been a focal point for Denmark, the Faroe Islands and Greenland, and the historic 50th Jubilee of the Accession to the Throne was celebrated throughout all of 2022. It was – despite changes in the plans along the way – a fine and stately milestone. I would like to use this occasion to thank both The Royal House of Denmark's partners and the many Danes around the country who contributed to the richly memorable celebration.

2022 offered other mileposts in The Royal Family. In February, H.R.H. The Crown Princess turned 50 years old, and, in April, the family was able to celebrate H.R.H. Princess Isabella's confirmation at Fredensborg Palace Church.

However, it was also a year in which The Royal House of Denmark experienced internal challenges that affected The Royal Family and The Royal House of Denmark as a whole. The discussions about The Crown Prince Couple's choice of school gave rise to a big debate in the public. Also, The Queen's decision to change the titles of H.R.H. Prince Joachim's children resulted in strong reactions. This naturally affected all involved, who, however, by the end of the year, were in agreement to look forward.

The Royal House of Denmark had a negative accounting result for the year. The Royal House of Denmark had budgeted a deficit because of the increased level of activity in connection with the Jubilee of The Queen's Accession to the Throne, but the finances were further affected by the energy and inflation crisis. In addition, the accounting result reflects investments in IT security, in mobile workplaces and sustainability. This specifically means that The Royal House of Denmark's capital was reduced from approximately 18 million DKK to approximately 10 million DKK.

For the coming year, this will mean an essential focus on efficiencies and prioritization in relation to the work of The Royal House of Denmark.

The Royal House of Denmark will continue the adaptation and future-proofing of The Royal House of Denmark by adjusting the division of duties and roles for both The Royal Family and The Court. This will take place out of respect for the support The Royal House of Denmark enjoys in the Danish population and with the natural expectation from the Danish people to, at all times, have a Royal House in tune with the times.

The Royal House of Denmark's report



Introduction

“My first New Year’s greeting this evening goes to the Ukrainians in Denmark and to all of the Ukrainian people. May this terrible war come to an end, and may your proud and beautiful country flourish again.”

Those were the words in H.M. The Queen’s New Year’s Address on the last evening of a year that was strongly marked by the war in Ukraine.

A few weeks after the war broke out on 24 February, Queen Margrethe’s and Prince Henrik’s Foundation and Crown Prince Frederik’s and

Crown Prince Mary’s Foundation donated a total of one million DKK for emergency aid for the war’s victims. In connection with the donation, The Royal House of Denmark sent out a news release, in which Her Majesty expressed her support for the Ukrainian people.

The first months of the year continued to be affected by the coronavirus pandemic, and, for the second year in a row, the traditional New Year's banquet and the subsequent New Year's levees had to be cancelled.

Nevertheless, 2022 was both a busy and varied year for The Queen and The Royal Family, who took part in approximately 500 official events and arrangements in Denmark and abroad – from Skagen to Skælskør and from The Netherlands to New York.

The year also included a number of visits by royal guests, government leaders and heads of state. In addition, The Queen received 33 incoming ambassadors and six departing ambassadors in audiences during the year.

The public audiences, which were suspended in the first months of the year due to the coronavirus shutdown, take place approximately twice per month at Christiansborg Palace. In 2022, Her Majesty greeted more than 1100 audience seekers who appeared for the year's public audiences, which totaled 15 in all. In addition, The Queen sent approximately 8000 congratulations to Danes in connection with special occasions, such as 100th birthdays and diamond wedding anniversaries.

In a constitutional monarchy like the Danish one, The Queen, as head of state, has a number of functions in the administration of state, among other things in connection with the formation of governments. On 1 November, parliamentary elections were held in Denmark, and, on 15 December, a new government under the leadership of Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen was presented to The Queen and The Crown Prince at Christian IX's Palace at Amalienborg.

Another constitutional duty for Her Majesty is to preside over the meetings of the Council of State, where the laws adopted by the Danish Parliament are signed by The Queen, and where the government briefs The Queen about new legislative proposals that it will advance in the Danish Parliament. In 2022, The Queen carried out five Councils of State, which meant that, by the end of the year, The Queen had participated in 564 Councils of State during her reign.

Queen Elizabeth II, who for seven decades had been head of state of The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland as well as 14 other Commonwealth countries, died on 8 September.

The same evening, The Queen sent a personal letter of condolence to the new monarch, H.M. King Charles III. In the letter, The Queen emphasized the close ties between Denmark and Great Britain.

The Crown Prince's speech to The Queen at the gala banquet at Christiansborg Palace in September was one of the highlights in a jubilee year that included a large number of commemorations of The Queen's 50 years on the throne – despite necessary changes in the plans along the way.

Due to the situation with COVID-19 at the time, The Royal House of Denmark thus had to postpone the large celebrations that were planned for January. The arrangements were therefore delayed until September, as The Queen still wanted a festive celebration in which the Danish people could take part.

On 14 January, The Queen and The Royal Family arrived on the Royal Saloon Carriage at Roskilde Station around midday. On this day, it was 50 years since The Queen, with the motto "God's help, the love of The People, Denmark's strength", succeeded her father, Frederik the 9th, as Den-

mark's sovereign. At Roskilde Cathedral, which has been The Royal House of Denmark's official burial church since the 1500s, The Royal Family participated in a ceremony and wreath-laying in the open mausoleum of Frederik the 9th and Queen Ingrid.

Before the visit in Roskilde, Her Majesty had begun the day at Christiansborg Palace with a Council of State, followed by the Danish Parliament's official celebration of the jubilee in the former Upper Chamber, with the participation of The Royal Family.

In light of Queen Elizabeth II's death on 8 September, a number of adjustments were made in the postponed celebration of the jubilee, which meant that, among other things, the planned coach ride and the official reception at Copenhagen City Hall were postponed.

However, The Royal Family, Nordic heads of state, official Denmark and other invited guests still had the opportunity to celebrate The Queen both on land and at sea during the weekend of 10-11 September, which, among other things, included a luncheon aboard the Royal Yacht Dannebrog as well as a command performance at The Royal Danish Theatre and a gala banquet at Christiansborg Palace. Both the command performance and the banquet were broadcast on TV.

A couple of months later, thousands of Danes had lined up along Copenhagen's streets when 56 horses from the Guard Hussar Regiment's Mounted Squadron escorted The Queen in the 130-year-old Golden Wedding Anniversary Coach from Amalienborg to Copenhagen City Hall on 12 November. There, the Municipality of Copenhagen hosted an official luncheon, where Her Majesty and The Royal Family were able, among other things, to experience entertainment by the Zapolski Strings, Vesterbro Ungdomsgård and the Copenhagen Royal Chapel Choir.



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On 21 May, Tivoli celebrated The Queen with a ballet gala, tree planting, an exhibition about Her Majesty's 20-year artistic work with costumes, sketches and scenography for the Pantomime Theatre – and a tour in The Old Roller Coaster.

Her Majesty was also celebrated outside the capital. In keeping with tradition, the summer cruises took The Queen around the whole country, and, in connection with the early summer cruise to the Municipality of Aarhus, The Queen took part in a folk festival in the Memorial Park in connection with the jubilee. Later in the summer, the citizens in the French city of Cahors also got the opportunity to celebrate Her Majesty in connection with a special showing of the retrospective exhibition "Margrethe II of Denmark, Artist-Queen" at the city's newly renovated Musée Henri-Martin.

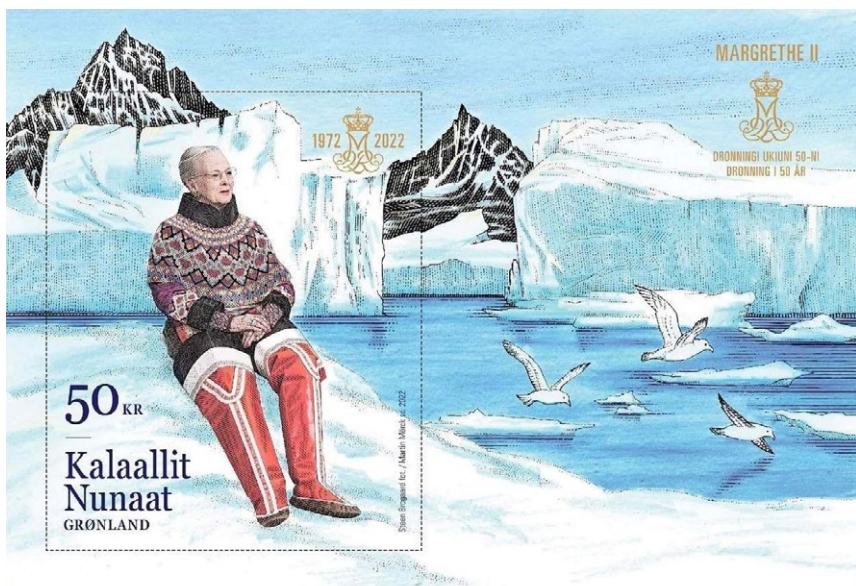

H.R.H. The Crown Princess's 50th birthday

In the past year, The Royal Family was able to celebrate yet another happy event, when H.R.H. The Crown Princess turned 50 years old on 5 February.

Due to the continuous development of the coronavirus situation, The Royal House of Denmark chose to cancel the planned gala banquet at Rosenborg Castle, but the birthday was nevertheless celebrated during February – including with a number of new initiatives.



In connection with The Crown Princess's round birthday, new official gala portraits of The Crown Princess were taken by photographer Hasse Nielsen, while the design agency Kontrapunkt created the birthday logo. The Greenlandic telecom and postal company Tusass issued a new stamp, on which The Crown Princess is attired in the traditional Greenlandic national costume. The stamp is sold with an added value of 1 DKK, which, according to The Crown Princess's wish, goes to The Dandelion Center for children and young people in Nuuk.

As a prelude to the birthday, The Royal Danish Collection Koldinghus and The Museum of National History at Frederiksborg Castle opened their doors to new special exhibitions about The Crown Princess. The exhibitions were not only a portrait of Denmark's Crown Princess, but also an exploration of the Glücksborg dynasty's history, which made visitors more knowledgeable about a number of the crown princesses of the past.

The Crown Princess's longstanding engagement in public health, nature conservancy and interdisciplinary partnerships was the starting point for a number of new initiatives in connection with the 50th birthday.

"When children and young people are ill, everyday life and the feeling of well-being become more important than ever before". Those were the words of The Crown Princess on 1 February in a video speech, in which it was announced that Rigshospitalet's new hospital for children and young people, which will open during 2025, will be named "Mary Elizabeth's Hospital".

A few days later, The Crown Princess broke the first ground for the Copenhagen Zoo's new

facility "Mary's Australian Garden", which will house animal species from The Crown Princess's homeland. Also, a new University of Copenhagen knowledge center that has the objective of finding new solutions for current societal challenges through an interdisciplinary knowledge environment came to bear The Crown Princess's name.

Interdisciplinarity and collaboration have also been the watchwords in The Crown Princess's 15 years of work leading The Mary Foundation. On 23 March, the foundation was able to gather partners for a celebration of The Crown Princess's birthday at Moltke's Palace, where Her Royal Highness spoke about The Mary Foundation's vision of a society in which all experience that they belong.

The course of the year in The Royal Family

H.M. The Queen

The past year was a year marked by jubilees. In 1932, the Royal Yacht Dannebrog hoisted its flag for the first time. Therefore, The Queen was able to celebrate the Royal Yacht's 90th jubilee with the opening of the exhibition "Dannebrog. Royal Yacht for 90 years" at M/S Maritime Museum of Denmark in February, and, later in the spring, Her Majesty, together with The Crown Prince Couple and H.R.H. Princess Benedikte, marked the jubilee with a luncheon and sailing tour on Øresund for the ship's current and former captains.

In the summer, 90-year jubilee celebrant Dannebrog passed under the Great Belt Bridge at the same time as the Tour de France field cycled over the bridge.

On a spring evening in March, Amalienborg's four palaces were enveloped in ballet, song and music, when the Queen Ingrid Honors Award was given out for the tenth and final time. To mark the occasion, The Queen, together with her sisters Princess Benedikte and Queen Anne-Marie, decided to use Amalienborg's four palaces for the show "The Palaces Dance", which was broadcast on TV2.

The year also offered other cultural highlights for The Queen. In March, Her Majesty assumed patronage of the organization "Dansk Teater 300 år", and thereby marked her lifelong interest in theatrical arts, and, on 11 June – Prince Henrik's birthday – The Queen was able for the first time to award the newly established "Prince Henrik Prize" for poetry. The two authors' organizations

Danske Skønlitterære Forfattere and Danish Authors' Society are behind the poetry prize, which went to the poet Klaus Høeck.

The Queen herself was acclaimed for her language arts in the past year. For "a lifelong and desirable art of public speaking", The Queen thus received Danske Taler's Honorary Award during the annual conference for speechwriters in November. The Queen was also awarded the Nordic Association's Language Award 2022 in Oslo in September. The award was presented by H.M. Queen Sonja of Norway on the grounds

that The Queen is an important voice for Nordic cooperation, community and language.

During the summer, Dannebrog headed out on the year's cruises, which took Her Majesty to the municipalities of Helsingør, Anholt, Aarhus, Slagelse, Lolland and Frederiksberg. The annual summer cruises on the Royal Yacht are a tradition extending back to Christian the 10th and Frederik the 9th, and The Queen has carried on the tradition, which has the objective of using Dannebrog to create contact with all parts of the realm.



Despite a busy calendar, The Queen was also active as a practicing artist during the year. As a scenographer and costume designer, Her Majesty was both behind the premiere of the restaging of "The Pig Boy" at the Pantomime Theatre on 18 June and behind the Christmas ballet "The Nutcracker", which was newly premiered on 26 November at Tivoli.

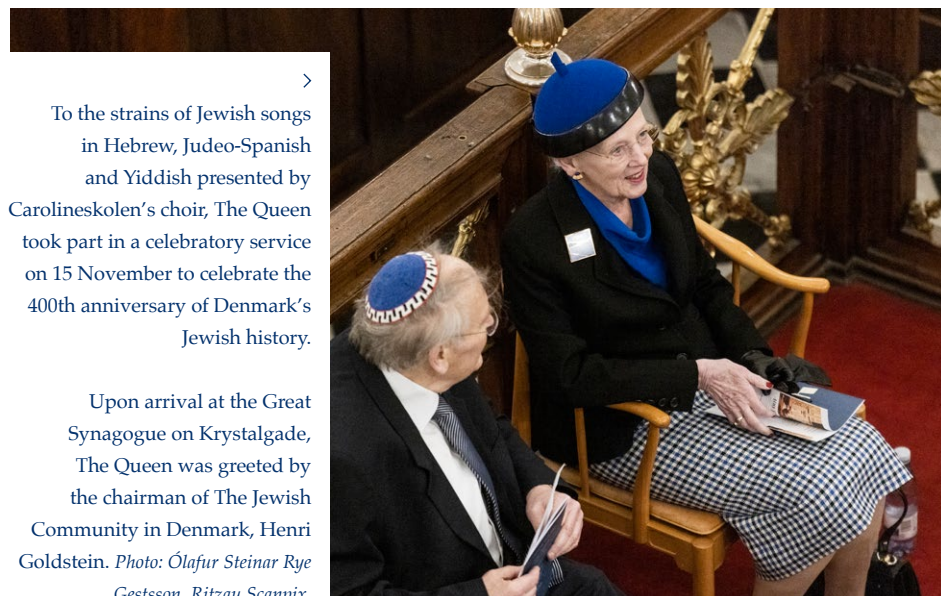

In November 1622, Christian the 4th officially invited Jews to settle in Denmark. This milestone in Denmark's Jewish history was commemorated by The Queen with a visit to The Danish Jewish Museum and with participation in a celebratory service at the Great Synagogue in Copenhagen.

Another group that also immigrated to Denmark consisted of the Dutch farmers who, in 1521, were invited by Christian the 2nd to Amager, where they settled in Store Magleby. There, The Queen and The Netherlands' former queen, H.R.H. Princess Beatrix – with a one-year delay due to coronavirus restrictions – were able to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the Dutch immigration in May.



The Crown Prince Couple

Green transition, future healthcare and international peace and security. These were some of the themes for The Crown Prince Couple's journeys for Denmark and Danish interests in 2022.

In June, The Crown Prince Couple led a large business delegation to The Netherlands, which is Denmark's seventh largest export market, and, in November, the couple traveled with 36 Danish companies to Vietnam, which holds great potential for Danish solutions in wind energy and energy efficiency. The Crown Prince Couple's visit in Vietnam also marked that it has been 50 years since Denmark and Vietnam established diplomatic relations.

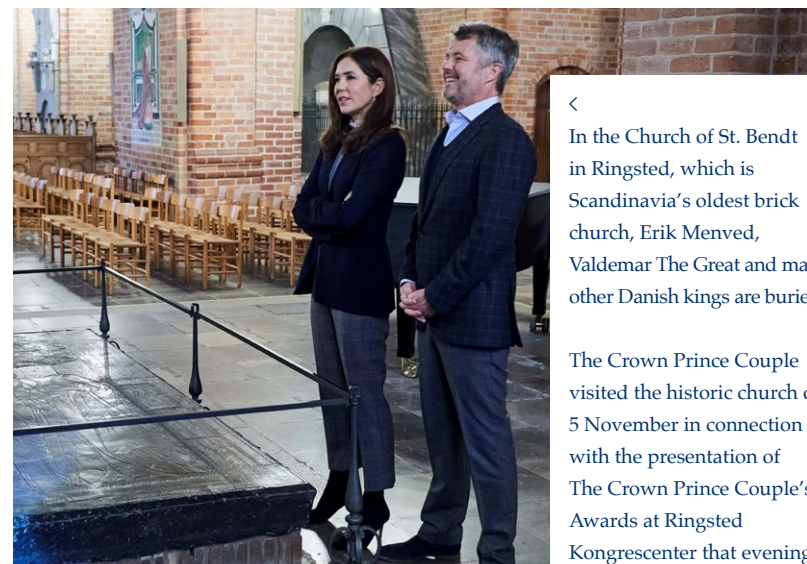


Representatives of nearly all of the world's countries met in September at the opening of the UN's 77th General Assembly in New York, and The Crown Prince Couple traveled to New York in this connection to take part in the international launch of Denmark's candidacy for the UN's Security Council in 2025-2026. Since the creation of the UN in 1945, Denmark has previously been a member of the Security Council four times.

The Crown Prince Couple also led a number of large events in Denmark, including the festive and traditional evening party at Christiansborg Palace for the government, the Danish Parliament and the Danish members of the European Parliament, which is held once within each parliamentary term. On 23 September, The Crown Prince Couple hosted the evening event, as The Queen was prevented from taking part due to infection with COVID-19.

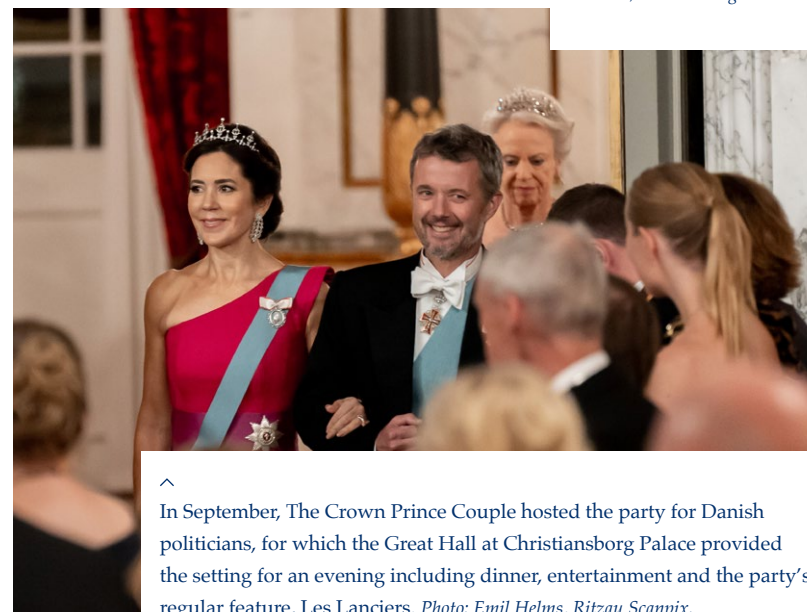

The Crown Prince

For many years, natural science, innovation and technology have been a special focus area for The Crown Prince – especially when it comes to promoting entrepreneurship among children and young people.

On a Thursday in October, it was bubbling with inventive ideas when 7th grade students at Vibenhush Skole introduced The Crown Prince to their best proposals on the theme “Our city in the future” as a part of the Danish Foundation for Entrepreneurship’s inventor competition, Project Edison.

Inventiveness was also strong among the 20 technological entrepreneurial companies that were visited by The Crown Prince on 16 November at DTU Science Park, where they took part in the growth competition, Danish Tech Challenge. Since 2014, The Crown Prince has participated in the annual presentation of The Danish Industry Foundation’s Entrepreneur Award to the winner of the growth competition.

In the world of natural science, 2022 was a special jubilee year. It was 100 years since professor Niels Bohr received the Nobel Prize in physics, and 100 years since the Niels Bohr Institute was founded. As patron of Videnskabsår2022, The Crown Prince took part in the official 100th anniversary celebration on 3 March at Copenhagen City Hall, where His Royal Highness gave a speech and awarded the Niels Bohr Institute’s Medal of Honor.

Ever since the UN climate conference COP-15 took place in Copenhagen in 2009, The Crown Prince has been engaged in the global climate and environmental challenges and in focusing

on Denmark’s role as a leading nation in the green transition.

In the spring, The Crown Prince, together with Minister for Climate, Energy and Utilities Dan Jørgensen, led two thematic visit days on Zealand, on Funen and in Jutland, during which His Royal Highness visited a number of the Danish companies that are developing energy efficiency technologies.

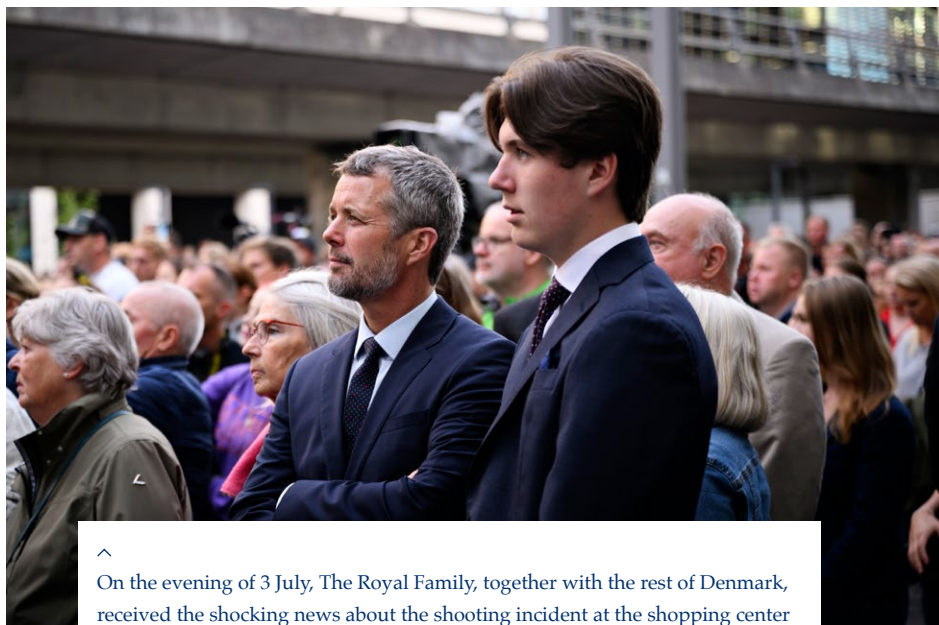

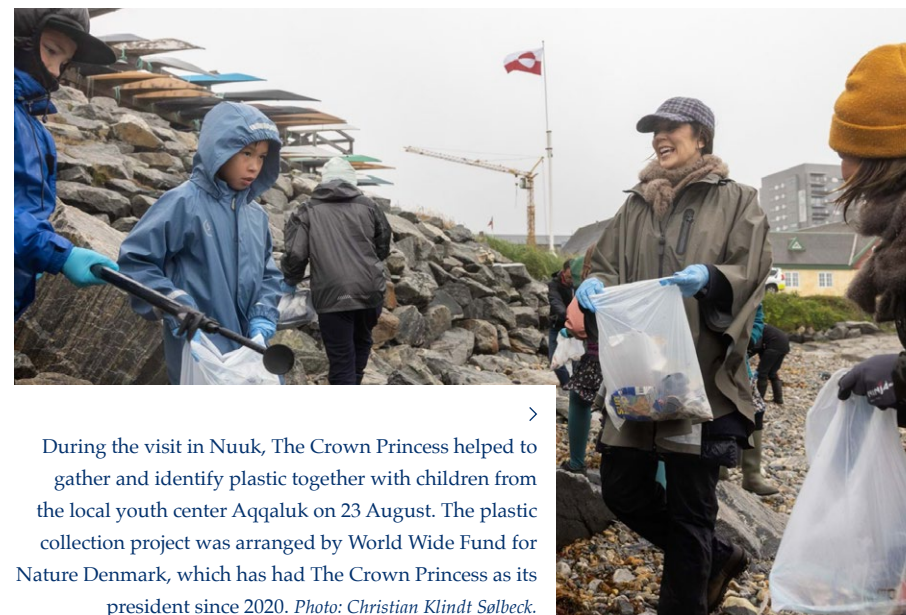
The Crown Princess

From the world's largest mangrove ecosystem in Bangladesh to the beaches in Nuuk. In 2022, H.R.H. The Crown Princess set focus on the vulnerability of nature both in Denmark and in a number of countries most exposed to climate change.

In April, The Crown Princess, together with Minister for Development Cooperation Flemming Møller Mortensen, visited Bangladesh on the 50th anniversary of the country's establishment of diplomatic relations with Denmark. The Crown Princess last visited the country in 2017, and the visit this time focused on how nature-based solutions can counter the consequences of climate

change for the population, the nature and the biodiversity in the country.

Biodiversity and nature conservation were also among the themes for The Crown Princess's visit to Greenland in August. There, The Crown Princess also focused on the well-being of children and young people in Greenland, among other ways in connection with a visit to The Dandelion Center for children and young people together with The Mary Foundation and with participation in the conference "Together on grief" as patron of the organizations Children, Youth & Grief and The Danish National Center for Grief.

For many years, The Crown Princess has been engaged in the fight for the rights of girls and women and has been patron of the UN Population Fund, UNFPA, since 2010. In November, The Crown Princess participated in a meeting on Zanzibar of the ICPD25 High-Level Commission, which aims to raise the awareness of efforts that will ensure a world in which all girls and women have equal rights and opportunities.

Prince Joachim

Since 2020, H.R.H. Prince Joachim has worked to strengthen Denmark's military cooperation with France in the role as defence attaché at The Danish Embassy in Paris.

2022 was yet another busy year in the role as liaison between the defence ministries of the countries, in which The Prince particularly focused on strengthening defence industrial cooperation. Among other things, The Prince led the Danish delegations' participation in a number of prominent trade fairs in the defence field.

As defence attaché, The Prince also participated in a number of military memorials and commemorations, including in an arrangement at the Arc de Triomphe in Paris on 2 June, when France's president relighted the flame at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and in an event in Braine, northeast of Paris, on 11 November, when The Prince took part in a remembrance of 79 Southern Jutland soldiers from the First World War who are laid to rest there.

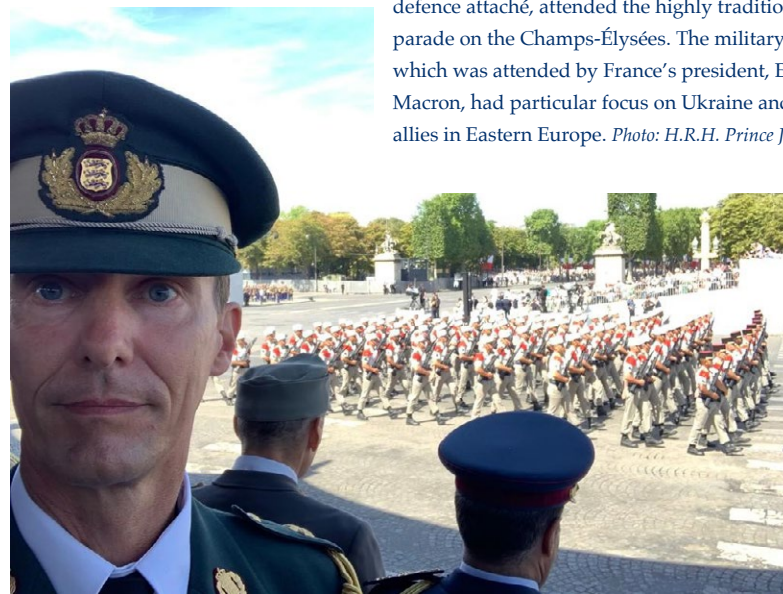

More than 25 different countries were represented when Prince Joachim participated in a dinner on 23 August for Copenhagen Goodwill Ambassadors, where The Prince praised the network's work to promote Copenhagen and Denmark internationally. On the same day, The Prince also took part in praising the effort to preserve the national cultural heritage when His Royal Highness took part in presentation of Prince Henrik's Europa Nostra Award, which was handed out for the first time in 2008.

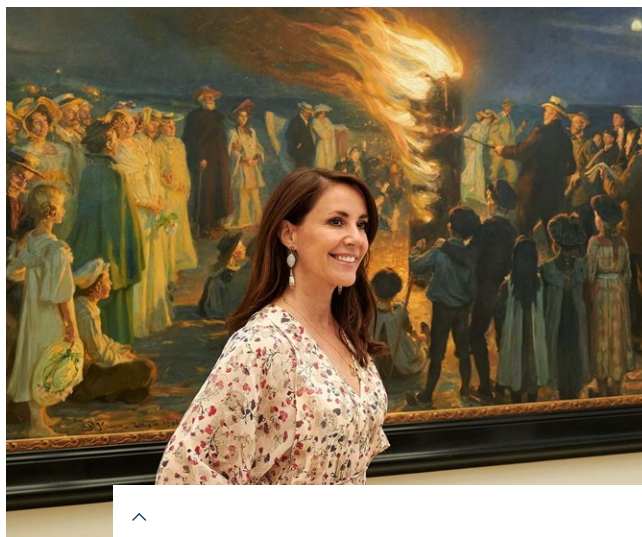

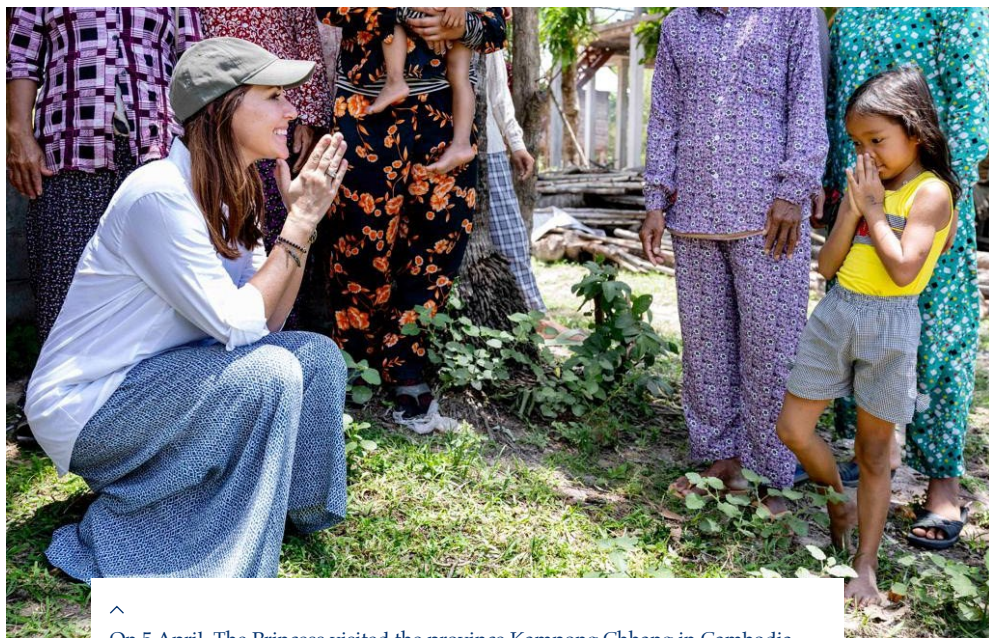

A month later, The Princess once again represented a Danish-French art collaboration. This time in the French city of Cahors, where The Princess presided over the opening of The Queen's retrospective exhibition "Margrethe II of Denmark, Artist-Queen". The exhibition marked both the Jubilee of The Queen's Accession to the Throne and the close connection between The Royal Family and the area around Cahors, where The Queen and Prince Henrik bought Château de Cayx in 1974.



The past year included a happy reunion with Cambodia, which was the first country Princess Marie visited as patron of DanChurchAid in 2012. The trip in April marked the organization's 100th jubilee, and the followers on The Royal House of Denmark's social media platforms could read along every day in The Princess's "digital diary", which reported on DanChurchAid's projects dealing with poverty alleviation, sustainable development and strengthening of rights in the country.

A number of The Princess's other patronages were also able to celebrate jubilees in 2022, and Princess Marie thus also had the opportunity to participate in the 125th anniversary of Denmark's only epilepsy hospital, Filadelfia, in May and in Autism Denmark's 60th anniversary in September. On a mild late summer day in August, Princess Marie herself was able to mark an anniversary in the name of music and community. Namely, it was The Princess's 10th visit to the Tønder Festival, which has had The Princess as its patron since 2009.

Princess Benedikte

For H.R.H. Princess Benedikte, 2022 was a year that, among other things, offered a number of exciting events in the worlds of art, equestrian sports and the Scout movement – and a visit to Germany's largest island in the North Sea.

Sailing from Rømø, Princess Benedikte arrived on 18 May at the German island Sild, which is located in The Wadden Sea National Park. The island's

20,000 permanent residents include a Danish minority, which The Princess met, among other ways, at a prayer service in the Danish church on Sild, in connection with a visit to Sild Danish Kindergarten and at the reopening of Sild Danish School. The visit also focused on Denmark as a holiday country and as a pioneering country for green transition and digitalization.

During the World Championships in Equestrian Sports in August, it was a special moment when Princess Benedikte was able to present the Lis Hartel Memorial Award to her own daughter, H.H. Princess Nathalie zu Sayn-Wittgenstein-Berleburg, who, among other things, has been the trainer for the Danish national dressage team.

2022 was a spectacular year for Danish equestrian sports. A month later, The Princess, who has had a strong engagement in equestrianism throughout life, had invited the World Championship competition's riders, organizers and volunteers to a reception at Amalienborg, where The Princess thanked the participants for their great effort.



In the world of sports, Princess Benedikte has also focused for many years on the importance of ensuring that people with a handicap also get the opportunity to engage in sports. In May, The Princess was present at the Special Olympics Sports Festival in Kolding, where 1,200 athletes with general learning disabilities or developmental disabilities competed against each other during the festival, which had a central focus on health, community and new friendships.

Community and joy of life was also a leading theme for Scout Jamboree Denmark 2022, which took part in Hedeland Nature Park near Roskilde. On 28 July, The Princess, as chairperson of the board for Jamboree Denmark 2022, visited the camp, where more than 32,000 scouts from 52 countries gathered for bonfires, fellowship and outdoor life.

The royal foundations

The Royal Family's extensive work and engagement in a wide range of social areas also manifests itself in the year's distributions from the royal foundations, Queen Margrethe's and Prince Henrik's Foundation, Crown Prince Frederik's and Crown Princess Mary's Foundation and The Nikolai and Felix Foundation.

In 2022, the foundations distributed more than 10 million DKK in all to 123 projects in the cultural, scientific and social fields, and The Royal Family participates actively in the work of selecting and evaluating the applications.

The capital of Queen Margrethe's and Prince Henrik's Foundation consists of the funds that resulted from the sale of the wedding coin in connection with The Queen's and Prince Henrik's wedding in 1967 as well as the amounts that have subsequently been donated to the foundation. The Crown Prince Couple established Crown Prince Frederik's and Crown Princess Mary's Foundation in 2006 for the proceeds from the sale of the wedding coin that was issued in connection with The Crown Prince Couple's wedding in 2004.

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The 81 projects that received support from Queen Margrethe's and Prince Henrik's Foundation in 2022 include, among others, the restoration of one of the country's most well-known Renaissance buildings, Christian the 4th's Stock Exchange Building in Copenhagen.

Among the recipients of the 15 distributions from Crown Prince Frederik's and Crown Princess Mary's Foundation were the organization Break the Silence, which provides support for counseling of children and young people exposed to violence, and Plastic Change, which is behind the Danish collection on World Cleanup Day.



The Royal House of Denmark's finances



Extracts from the annual report

The royal finances are presented here in summary form. The full text is contained in the Danish version of the annual report, which has been audited by the independent accounting firm Deloitte.

The annual accounts cover the Parliamentary allowance for The Queen and the annuities for The Crown Prince and The Crown Princess as well as information about the annuity for Prince Joachim.

The annual accounts for The Civil List and the Parliamentary Annuity paid to The Crown Prince and The Crown Princess

The annual Parliamentary allowance to The Queen is laid down in The Civil List Act, which is adjusted every year in accordance with movements in the pay index for employees in the state sector. In 2022, the Parliamentary allowance amounted to DKK 88.9 million.

The Parliamentary allowance covers expenses for salaries, goods and services as well as interior maintenance of the royal palaces, which the state makes available to The Queen.

The Parliamentary Annuity paid to The Crown Prince Couple is laid down in the Act on the Annual Allowance to Crown Prince Frederik of 2004, and the Parliamentary annuity paid to Prince Joachim and Princess Marie is laid down in the Act on the Annual Allowance to Prince Joachim. Adjustment of the annuities follows the same principles applied to the Parliamentary allowance to The Queen.

The Royal House of Denmark's travel costs for state visits abroad and other official foreign travel are covered by a framework under the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. In 2022 – similar to previous years – a limit of DKK 4.5 million was set.

Members of The Royal Family who receive annual allowances do not have to pay income tax, registration tax or green vehicle tax. This follows the Danish Withholding Tax Act and the laws covering vehicle registration and fuel consumption taxes. The Royal Family are subject to the normal rules governing estate, inheritance and property taxes. Value added tax is reimbursed. Reimbursement is limited annually to a percentage of the parliamentary allowance corresponding to the current rate of value added tax. The amounts in the report are thus calculated excluding VAT. In 2022, The Civil List received a VAT rebate of DKK 9,467,217 and The Court of The Crown Prince Couple received a VAT rebate of DKK 2,218,649.

The annual accounts for The Royal Civil List cover the Parliamentary allowance to The Queen

The accounts for The Civil List for 2022 show a deficit of approx. DKK 8.4 million.

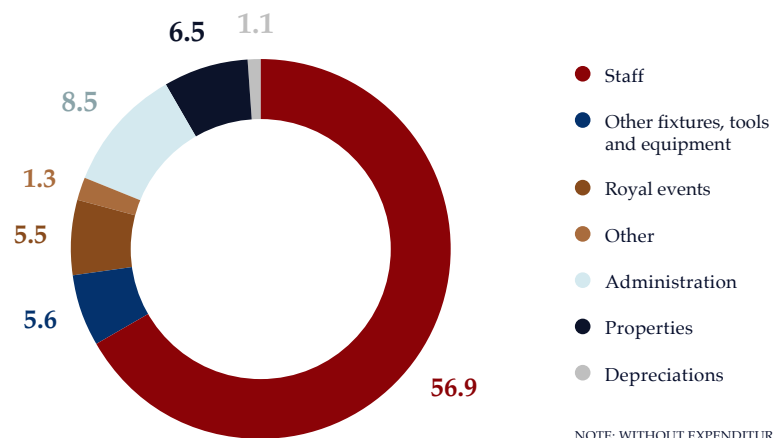
The result reflects a year in which The Royal House of Denmark had exceptionally budgeted a deficit in the form of expenditure of the savings in order to carry out the activities in connection with the Jubilee of The Queen's Accession to the Throne. At the same time, there were planned investments in continued upgrading of The Royal House of Denmark's IT security, in mobile workplaces and in establishment of charging stations for the increasing number of electric vehicles. In addition, extra tasks were contemplated in the budget concerning maintenance of premises, which had been postponed from 2021 due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Meanwhile, the accounting result was also affected by the increasing energy prices, which were approx. DKK 1.2 million higher than in 2021, as well as a negative result of approx. DKK 1.8 million for the securities in which The Royal House of Denmark's savings were invested. The Royal House of Denmark's finances were also strongly affected by the generally high inflation, just as was the case in the rest of the society.

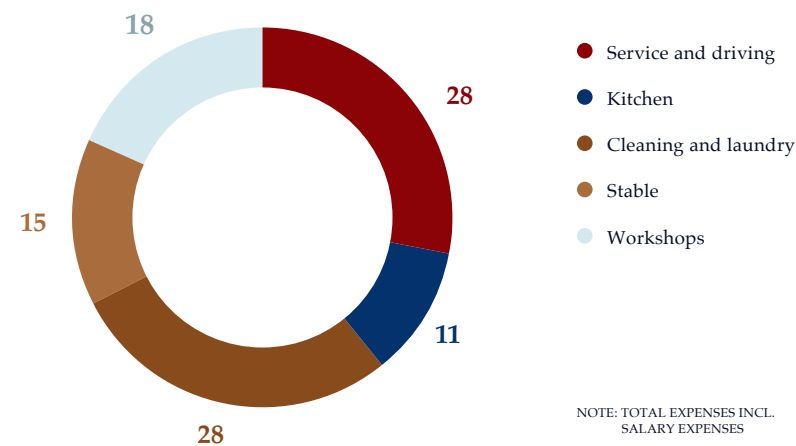
The personnel costs that go for salaries, pensions, etc. amounted to approx. DKK 57 million in 2022, corresponding to 58% of The Civil List's total expenses.
